Reef Tourism: Drivers & Trends

With over 1.9 million visitors/year, the Great Barrier Reef (GBR) is a key attraction in North Queensland, but is under pressure from various natural and man-made threats.

We aim to monitor the drivers and trends of reef tourism on the GBR (socio-demographics, motivations, activities and satisfaction) through visitor surveys distributed monthly by 11 participating reef tourism operators between Port Douglas and Airlie Beach.

We aim to understand profiles of reef and rainforest visitors, their visitation patterns and economic contribution to North Queensland through exit surveys conducted at the Cairns Domestic Airport (200 surveys each month).
